### **San Jose State University Football Game Notes**

San Jose State captains for the game were wide receiver Tim Crawley, linebacker Christian Tago, quarterback Kenny Potter and offensive lineman Jeremiah Kolone.

Linebacker Brett Foley carried the team's tool box, wide receiver Tim Crawley, the team's sword; and offensive guard Chris Gonzalez, the team's sledgehammer, to the field for the start of the game.

For the first time this season, San Jose State won a game despite trailing at halftime. The Spartans were behind, 14-7. The last time a game trailing at halftime was against Wyoming in 2013. San Jose State trailed Wyoming, 23-14 at halftime, and won 51-44 on a David Fales 1-yard run with 0:08 left in the game.

San Jose State now has wins over Fresno State in three of the last four games these teams played and twice in the last three contests conducted at Bulldog Stadium. Fresno State still leads the series, 40-37-3.

The Fresno State game marked the first time San Jose State shutout an opponent in the second half since the 2012 win at Navy, 12-0. The Fresno State and Hawaii games were the two contests this season San Jose State kept an opponent scoreless in the third quarter.

David Williams blocked San Jose State's first punt since the 2012 season to set up the first touchdown of the game. Bene Benwikere's punt block in the Military Bowl win was the last time the Spartans blocked a punt until the Fresno State game.

The San Jose State defense was credited with 14.0 tackles for loss in the Fresno State win. The last time the Spartan defense had as many tackles for loss in a game was in a 21-0 loss to Louisiana Tech on November 8, 2008.

Tim Crawley finished his San Jose State career in fifth place on the school's career receiving list with 151 receptions. Crawley had four receptions for 35 yards and an 8-yard touchdown play to open the scoring in his final game.

Bryce Crawford made field goals of 28, 22 and 23 yards to finish the season 11 consecutive field goals. Crawford was 16-of-18 for the season. His 88.9 season percentage trails only Austin Lopez who was 100.0 percent (17-of-17) in 2012.

Crawford finished the season as the team's leading scorer with 79 points – the fifth best single-season kick scoring total at San Jose State.

Deontae Cooper had his busiest day as a ball carrier to complete his college career. Cooper had a career-high 26 carries for 126 yards. Twenty-three of his carries came after halftime.

Christian Tago broke a seventh place tie for career tackles for loss with his 2.5 tackles for loss in the Fresno State game. He finished his career with 33.0 tackles for loss.

Frank Ginda's 4.0 tackles for loss was his single-game career best. Ginda led the Spartans with 14 tackles and finished the season as the team's leading tackler with 99 stops.

Isaiah Irving's 4.5 tackles for loss was a personal single-game best and the best by a Spartan in a game since Travis Johnson was credited with 6.0 tackles for loss against UC Davis in 2012. Irving had two of the team's 4.0 quarterback sacks.

Though Michael Carrizosa averaged only 40.6 yards on five punts, he placed four punts inside the 20-yard line – 10, 11, 8 and 9-yard lines. His last two punts that landed inside the 20 were in the fourth quarter.
