San Jose State University Football Game Notes

San Jose State is wore gold jerseys with blue pants for tonight's game with #5-ranked Stanford. As the road team, by rule, the Spartans are required to wear the light-colored jerseys. San Jose State received permission from the Pac-12 Conference and Stanford for the color combination.

For the sixth time since 1987, San Jose State missed out on an opportunity to begin a season with a 2-0 win-loss record.

With the loss to Stanford, San Jose State has lost 21 consecutive games to nationally-ranked opponents. The last Spartan win against a nationally-ranked team was a 27-24 victory over #9-TCU.

San Jose State averaged 3.7 yards per play. The last time the Spartans did not average at least 4.0 yards per play was in the 2011 opener when San Jose State averaged 3.6 yards per play in a 57-3 loss to Stanford.

For the second year in a row, Stanford had 17 points at halftime against San Jose State. In 2012, the Cardinal led 17-3. Tonight, San Jose State trailed 17-6 at halftime.

Tim Crawley saw his first action of the season as a running back. Crawley played solely as a wide receiver in the opener against Sacramento State.

Noel Grigsby set a San Jose State school record of 36 consecutive games with a reception when he caught his first pass of the game in the first quarter. He came into the game tied with Jalal Beauchman (2006-10) at 35 consecutive games.

Grigsby's third-quarter touchdown catch was the 17th of his career leaving him one shy of the school record of 18 set by Edell Shepherd in 2000 and 2001.

Austin Lopez made it 3-for-3 in field goals this season with field goals of 30 and 23 yards in the first half. Lopez was 17-for-17 in field goals in 2012.

Keith Smith notched his 16th career game with 10 or more tackles at Stanford. He opened the season with 18 tackles in the Sacramento State win and was credited with a team-best 12 stops against Stanford.

Jabari Carr became the 24th player in San Jose State history to catch at least 100 passes in a career. He entered the game with 97 receptions and matched his single-game best of eight receptions for the third time in his career in the Stanford game.

After notching three quarterback sacks against Sacramento State, San Jose State was unable to record a sack against Stanford.
